

Did You Know?

From The Nurse:

How to prevent ticks from biting:



- Wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts and tuck pants into socks or boots.
- \Diamond Tuck in your undershirt.
- Wear light-colored clothes (easier to see ticks).
- Use repellents that contain 20% or more DEET on exposed skin.
- Spray permethrin on shoes, socks, clothes and camping gear. Let dry before using. Permethrin kills ticks, mosquitoes, chiggers, mites and more than 55 other kinds of insects on contact. A single application lasts 6 washings or 42 days of sun exposure (see directions on bottle for use).
- Check yourself and pets for ticks often.

In April, over a hundred Highland, Ellenville, Kingston, Wallkill and New Paltz high school students attended a special One-Act performance of The Laramie Project at SUNY Ulster.
